



Interactive Maps: A Step-By-Step Guide

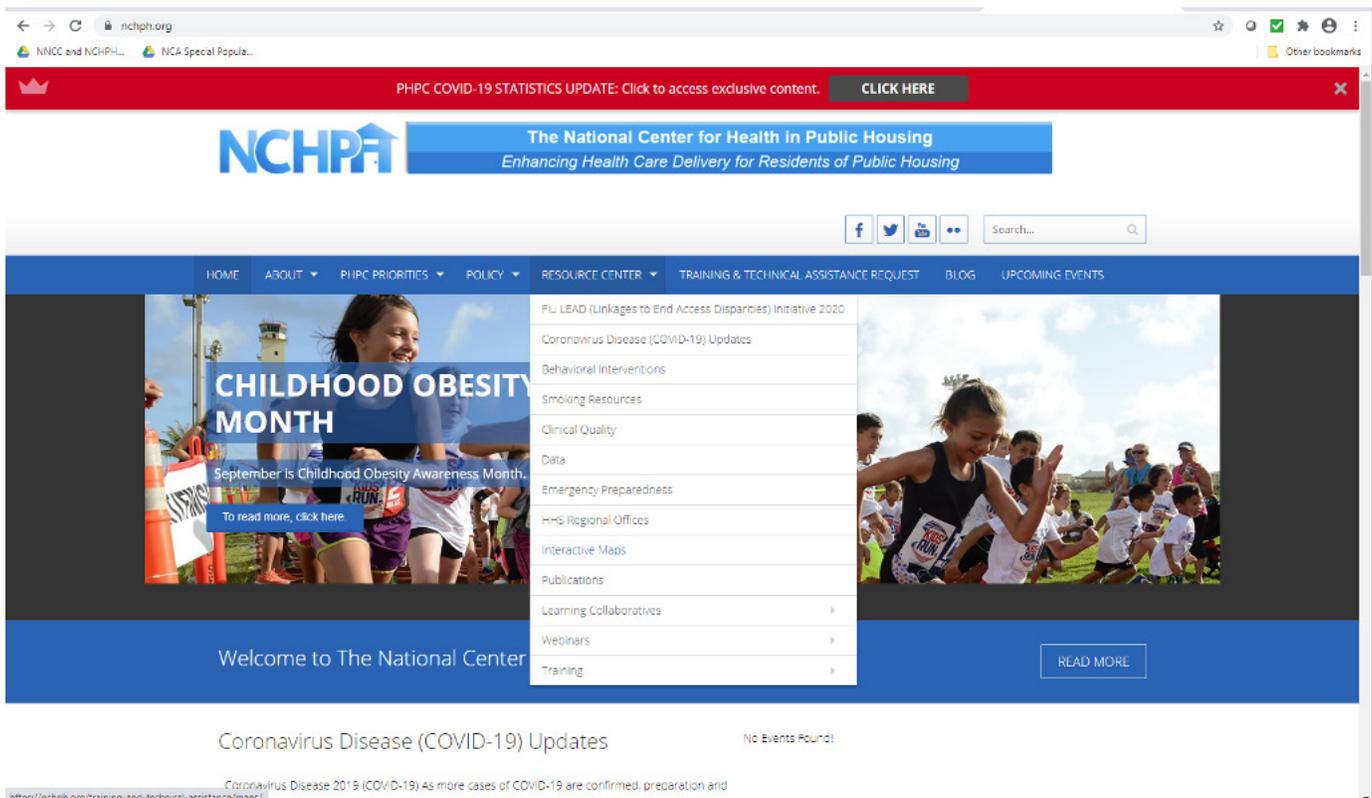

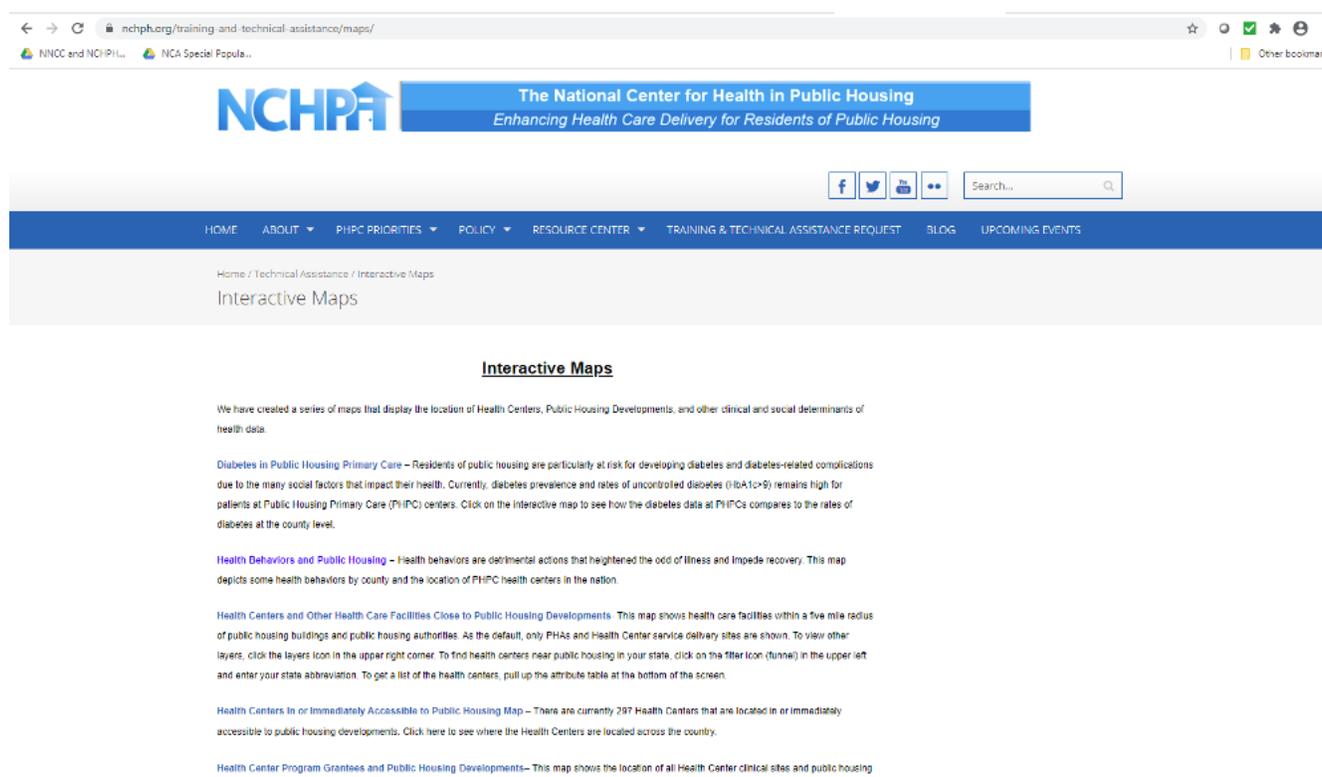
Fig. 1 NCHPH Website Resources Tab Drop Down Menu



Interactive Maps Landing Page

The landing page for the Interactive Maps provides a list of all the maps we have available as shown on Fig. 2. Each of our interactive maps display geographic information that health centers can use to find community partners, identify social determinants of health and diabetes data, and the locations of other HUD-funded and community resources close to your clinical sites.

Fig. 2 Interactive Maps Landing Page

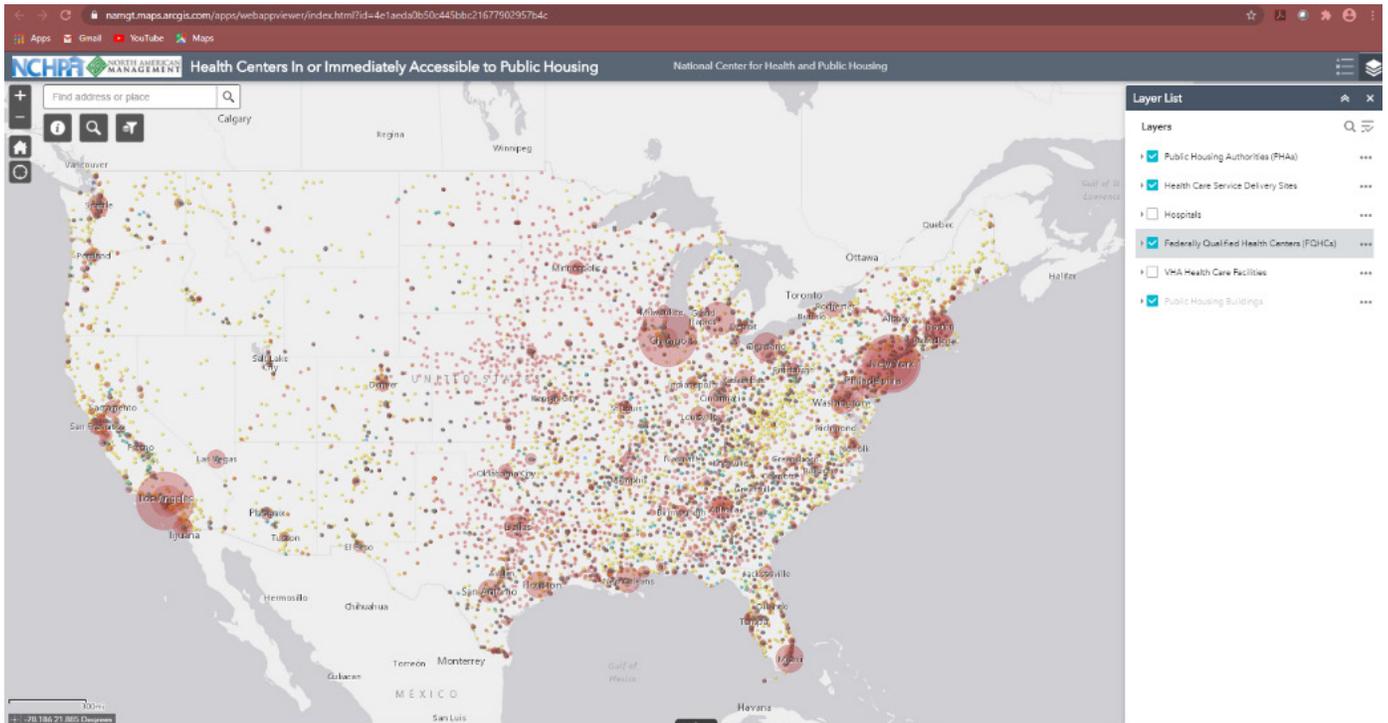


NCHPH maps contain a basemap, a set of data layers (many of which include interactive pop-up windows with information about the data), an extent, and navigation tools to pan and zoom. In general, the basemap and layers are hosted and shared through [ArcGIS Online](#). However, maps can also contain layers added directly to the map and layers and basemaps referenced externally. Many maps also contain scaled symbols and other smart styling that reveal data and patterns as you interact with it.

Exploring NCHPH Maps

Let's explore the Health Centers In or Immediately Accessible to Public Housing map, depicted on Fig. 3. The maps contain layers, and layers contain features.

Map Layers

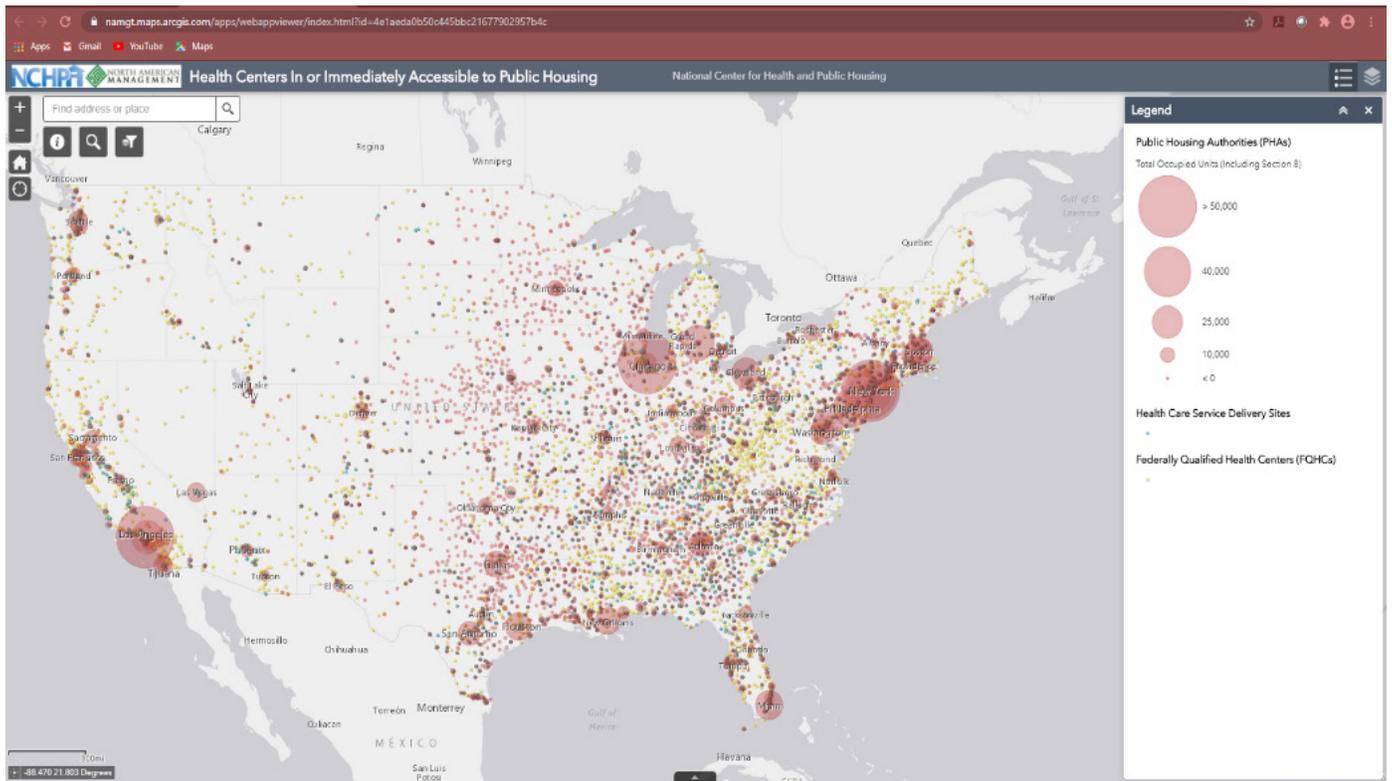
Layers are the mechanism used to display geographic datasets in [ArcMap, ArcGlobe, and ArcScene](#). Each layer references a dataset and specifies how that dataset is portrayed using symbols and text labels. You can access attribute information for feature layers by [opening the layer's attribute table, clicking on a feature using the Identify tool](#).

The layer list on Fig. 3 includes Public Housing Authorities, Health Care Service Delivery Sites, Hospitals, Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), VHA Health Care Facilities, and Public Housing Buildings. You may check or un-check the boxes at the layers list based on what you want the map to display.

Map Legends

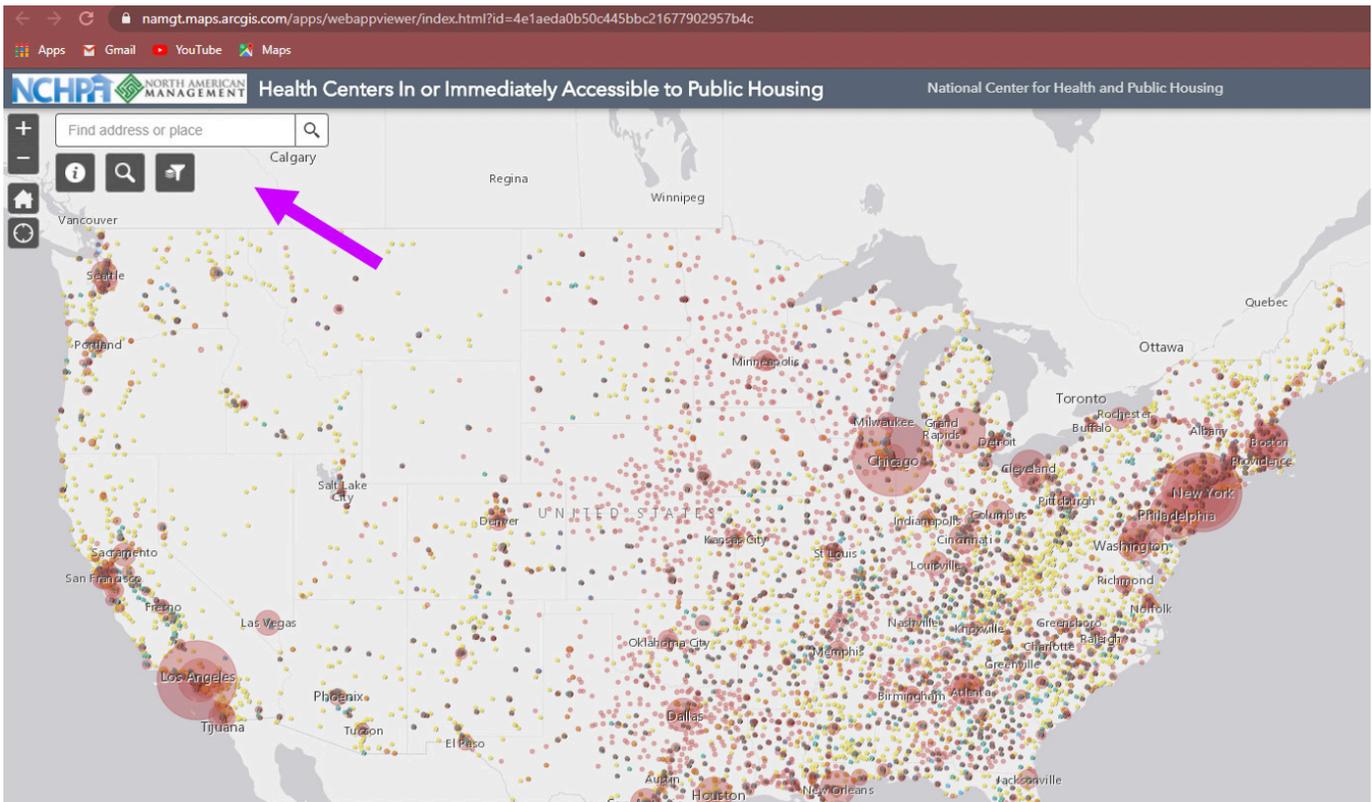
Fig. 4 Health Centers In or Immediately Accessible to Public Housing with Legend

A map legend conveys the meaning of symbols that represent map features. It is particularly useful when the map has multiple operational or thematic layers. In this map legend shown in Fig. 4, you can see that the size of the Public Housing Authority dot represents the total occupied units. Therefore, a larger dot represents a larger housing authority.

Search Feature

You can zoom in and out of the map to see a specific location, or you can type in a city, state or address in the search box as shown in Fig. 5.

Underneath the search box are other key features:

The information box, represented by the letter "i" gives basic information and instructions on how to use the map, as well as identifies the data sources; you can also use the Filter feature, represented by a picture of a filter to look at specific states or layers.



Clicking on the map directly, will also show you additional information. For example, clicking on the Public Housing Development dot will show you the name, address, and total occupied units. While clicking directly on the health care site will show you the name, address, and website for that health center.
